2010 marks the final year of a three-year goal to raise \$4.2 million for student awards. The Gala is currently two thirds of the way toward that goal, having raised over \$2.8 million after two years.

"Education is an important key to the future of our city, our province and our globe. The more people who are educated, the better off we'll be."

For more than 15 years, this belief has driven Dr. Paul Byrne and his wife Nancy to support the Mad Hatter's Gala. Dr. Paul Byrne is the president and CEO of Grant MacEwan University and Nancy is the Honorary Mad Hatter for 2010.

"MacEwan has always had very strong connections to the community," said Dr. Byrne. "The Mad Hatter's Gala is a positive example of how the community comes out to support the students."

Students receive scholarships from the Gala based on outstanding academic achievement. Scholarships are available in all programs of study and range in value from \$1,500 for diploma and certificate students to \$2,000 for students enrolled in degree programs.

When it comes to giving, it isn't just the financial contribution but also the gesture that's important, as Paul and Nancy witnessed at one particularly memorable Mad Hatter's Gala.

Dr. Byrne recalls the year that the Honourable Lois Hole, who was Lieutenant Governor of the province at the time, wore a handcrafted hat covered in daisies and orchids. She ended up donating her hat to the live auction, which resulted in a bidding war.

"It didn't even matter how much money was raised," said Dr. Byrne. "It was the gesture that counted."



"Doing what is right." This philosophy drives Dennis Mozak's company, Synergy Projects Ltd., and is exemplified by his commitment to serve as title sponsor of the Mad Hatter's Gala until 2012.

Part of Synergy Projects' commitment to doing what is right includes supporting the community, which is why the company first became involved with the Gala.

"We initially supported the Mad Hatter's Gala because we believe in post-secondary institutions and in the importance of education," said Mozak. "Our relationship with MacEwan has evolved over the past few years and we were pleased to step in as the title sponsor. This year marks the 25th anniversary of the Gala, which means 25 years of connecting with the community and raising funds for student awards. This long-standing tradition is something Graham grew up with, since her parents used to attend the Gala years ago.

"I remember my parents' excitement of dressing up and going to the Gala over 20 years ago, each with their special hat," said Graham. "And now here I am, years later helping students and looking for that special hat like my parents did."

The firm Graham works at, Kasian Architecture Interior Design and Planning Ltd., has supported the Gala for decades. She became involved personally with the event in 2008 when she was asked to volunteer on the committee, and for the past two years has acted as chair of the organizing committee.
